KEEPING WISDOM FOR THE SAKE OF THE FUTURE

One of the important influences in my seminary education was Steve Charleston, who served as Cross-Cultural Studies Director at Luther-Northwestern Theological Seminary in St. Paul. Steve is a citizen of the Choctaw Nation and the retired Episcopal Bishop of Alaska.



As a systematic theologian with a cross-cultural orientation, Steve honored the indigenous spiritual experience of Native peoples and told their stories as faithful witnesses of God's revelation in the world, fulfilled in the gospel of Jesus. Just as the gospel does not deny or negate Jewish faith or the experience of Israel, but offers a key for interpreting and understanding all that came before, Steve invited us to consider the spiritual experience of the Native peoples and their storytelling wisdom as a true prelude to the gospel.

I am reminded of his invitation as we return this month to our Season of Creation in worship. The native peoples of this land have lived closer to the



earth than our present culture does. While European Christianity has tended to treat the earth and non-human parts of creation as resources to be used for human purposes, Native peoples speak of the animals, and even the rocks and trees, as our relatives. They learn wisdom from all these relatives and seek to live in respectful relationship with the rest of creation, aiming to take only what they need for themselves and always giving something back.

The Season of Creation calls our attention to God's creative work and the importance of the non-human in the biblical tradition. For these four weeks we shift our perspective to place the whole of creation as central.



SEASON

My culture respects the elders not only because of their wisdom, but because of their determination. The elders are tough. They have survived many struggles and many losses. Now, as they look ahead to another generation, they are determined that their sacrifices will not have been in vain, that their children's children will not grow up in a world more broken than the one they sought to repair. The elders are voices of justice. They are champions for the earth. They defend the conscience of the community. We follow the elders because they have a passion for tomorrow. They are people of the future, not the past.

Indigenous elders have wisdom to share, and our own scriptural tradition has deep wisdom for honoring creation. The climate crisis calls for wise, determined action. We surely don't want to pass on a world more broken than the one we inherited.

During these Creation Season weeks, as we reconsider our relationship with all that God has made, you will have opportunity to explore ways to take that action. Our Sunday Adult Education times (9:15-10:15am in the Chapel) will address a range of creation themes. On September 15, Kimberly Mueller of Alliant Energy will introduce the Community Solar Program. Retired educator Dave Bendlin will present Pollinator Plans for Southern Wisconsin Gardens on September 22. And, on September 29, Katy Grogan will share with us the local work of Citizens Climate Lobby and ways that we can participate in advocating for a better future.

Together, let us become champions for the earth.

GRATITUDE FOR A MEMORABLE FAIR WEEK

nother busy fair week has come and gone. Leading up to the fair, the Fair Task Force planned and strategized to improve over 2023. Eric, especially, shopped for food and food-booth supplies. He and Renee organized muscle to set up the food booth structure and haul items over there. They brought extra hands to help the parking lot team pound stakes, string flags, hang fencing, and place signs. Many of you donated soda and water. Finally there was a flurry of last-minute phone-calling to fill the gaps in the volunteer schedule. Then, it was fair time!

With the generous donation of your time, 96 of you covered the 1,352 volunteer hours in the food booth and parking lot, averaging out to 14 hours a person. A couple of you found your niche and handed out a greeting note card from First Lutheran with candy attached.

The Fair Task Force and First Lutheran thank everyone who supported the effort in any capacity, for their generous giving spirit. What rewards did we reap? Families and friends shared time together, and we made new friends. We had children and grandchildren taking food orders, waving cars to parking spots, and baking pies. A family from Midwest Christian Center had fun parking cars on a busy evening. We watched groups with smiling faces walking to and from the fair, and witnessed drivers who delighted in paying for parking for a second car. For the community we provided near- by parking and affordable food on the fair grounds.

The healthy proceeds from our parking lot totaled \$30,168, which went into First Lutheran's General Fund. The food booth profited a decent amount, \$4,788, which will be equally split between Big Brothers Big Sisters of South Central Wisconsin, HealthNet of Rock County, the local Open Table group which mentors a youth from Project 16:49, and First Lutheran itself, \$1,197 each.

Truly it was all a lot of work, but the work multiplied into blessings for our church family and our community. Thank you!

FIRST LUTHERAN CHURCH FOUNDATION Distributes 2024 Grants

A t the January 15, 2024 meeting of the First Lutheran Church Foundation Board we reviewed our investment results for 2023. As most of you know the stock market and most investments had positive results for the year. Therefore, the Board decided to allocate \$100,000 for grant disbursement for 2024. This is our highest level ever and we were very excited to move on to the grant application process. All grant applications were due on April 1, 2024. We received 21 applications for a total of \$177,984. It is unfortunate that we could not approve all of them. The needs in our community and church programs continue to be greater than the available dollars. At the foundation Board meeting on April 30, 2024, we carefully and thoughtfully reviewed all applications. Since that meeting, we have been working to disperse all of the approved applications. Financial Report (Tim Drinkwater)

Giving was below budget for July by -\$7,428 and below the July 2023 giving by -\$8,540 for regular contributions. Fair income was higher than budget for the food booth and parking lot. Income was lower for the food booth in 2024 than in 2023, the spreadsheet above does show it being significantly lower, however the donations to the outside organizations were made in August of 2023 (as the fair ended very close to the end of the month). Let me know if you have any questions about this part. Total income for July was below budget by -\$2,536.

Ministry Report - Pr. Michael

- Fair week was strong everyone was in good spirits and worked together. Thanks to all who contributed!
- VBS and day camp was a success 50+ kids and the youth did a fantastic job volunteering.
- There were 4 baptisms on 8/11/2024. The baptism celebrations are going well. The next celebration is scheduled for 9/22/2024.

New Business

- First Fest all boards have responded and are moving forward with their assigned tasks

CHURCH FINANCIALS

The financials for the new fiscal year through July 2024 are shown below. The weekly need is calculated by averaging the total budgeted expenses for 12 months (from July 2024 through June of 2025). The weekly average YTD is the total income received, divided by the number of weeks in this fiscal year, to date. The graph shows the budgeted expenses in green, the actual expenses in blue and the monthly income received as a black dot and line.
