# CENTERED IN LIFE-GIVING RELATIONSHIPS

A ccording to Eric Law in his book Holy Currencies, "Relationship" is the first of six elements that flow through any church that is living deeply into its purpose. This currency of relationship includes the relationships we build and deepen within the congregation, as well as the relationships we intentionally extend out into the wider community.



**Relationally Centered** 

During this Easter season, we have heard Jesus' steady encouragement to live in relationship with him and to share his love with

one another. Doing so, he promises, will keep us centered in Love, which is the divine mystery at the heart of John's Gospel. This is the life that Jesus keeps talking about. Others will know that we are Jesus' disciples when they see the love we have for one another.

As we keep living into FLC's goal to become relationally centered, we are living into Jesus' promise and releasing a current of new life into our community. Willow Gravert, a senior at Craig High School, recently gave witness to the ways that our love has impacted her life. In a video at our recent Graduation Sunday, she shared how the love she has experienced in the First Lutheran

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community has shaped her faith and her direction for the future. Her testimony is a powerful affirmation of the importance of relationship.

When we build relationships with other congregations, partner organizations, and businesses, and when we connect personally with community leaders, neighbors, and people who are struggling, we develop a broad network of relationships that opens us to a rich set of possibilities for living out our mission to share Jesus' life with others.

In the new organizational structure we have been envisioning for First Lutheran Church, we anticipate that one of the leadership teams will be all about building connections



with the community around us and deepening the caring relationships among people in the First Lutheran community itself. More about this will be shared at our Annual Meeting on June 22.

This month a core team of people from our congregation will also begin working with the "Good Futures Accelerator," a resource that helps churches to discover the intersection between mission, the needs of their community, and the assets of their church building. The process will involve conversation in the wider community and throughout the congregation. The goal of this work will be to develop a project that uses our building in a new way to increase funding for our mission by serving a real need in our community.

Later this summer, we will be "all hands on deck" for the 4H Fair Week. Many volunteers are needed to serve the Food Booth and to assist in the parking lot. It has been noted that during this week our congregation is the most visible to our community of any time during the year. The 4H Fair is both an important fundraiser for our congregation and a great opportunity to build relationships. How can you use this opportunity to meet people and build new connections? Even small interactions can have a big impact. I invite you to participate creatively in Fair Week with the intention to build new relationships and communicate the life we have been given to share!

We live out our mission to make God's love known when we nourish strong relationships together as a church and when we build a broad network with others. As we live and serve generously together, we also receive generously in ways that we couldn't anticipate beforehand. We build trust and goodwill and discover new opportunities to create common cause with others, enriching the wellness of our whole community. ①

# Prayerfully Consider Giving

Your generosity and devotion help us keep the church strong and vibrant. From staff salaries to building, youth and worship expenses, it costs about \$940,000 a year to maintain services, programs and relationships within our building and out in the community.

At the start of the 24-25 fiscal year, we had anticipated a \$98K gap between our income and expenses but already your participation and generous giving have reduced that gap. What if we could meet our expenses fully by the end of the fiscal year? That would put us in a strong position to grow forward and continue reaching and empowering people to live the way of Christ's love.

As the fiscal year comes to an end on June 30, we have the opportunity to make up the deficit in giving and balance the budget. Generous members of our congregation have offered to match dollar for dollar up to \$38,500 to keep us growing toward living into our vision. So far, we have raised \$13,192 of that goal!

# CONTINUING MASONRY RESTORATION 2025

During three weeks in April, masonry restoration work continued on and around the FLC Sanctuary pilasters. Combined with similar work in 2022 and 2023, we have now invested \$86,000 in this long delayed and much needed structural restoration work.

We're very pleased with the excellent work being done by Holton Brothers Masonry. Each year they have been primarily focused on grinding and repointing failed joints in the field stones and replacing urethane caulk control joints. There are many more areas, especially on the Education wing that will require similar work over time.

The Buildings and Grounds board is also looking to contract for an initial demonstration project cleaning the field stone on the East facade. These dark areas form over time due to stone that remains damp for long periods and as a result of environmental pollutants that crystallize and form crusts on the surface. Cleaning the stone properly must be done very carefully to avoid further damage.

Thanks to the FLC Foundation for providing matching grant funding to accomplish this work and to everyone who has contributed. We're working hard to persistently improve the structural integrity and appearance of our historic lannon stone building.



Another project we will be working on soon is the domestic water service on the west side of the building. This 70 year old cast iron lateral runs from an obsolete manhole in Randall Avenue to the FLC boiler room. Through testing with the City of Janesville, we know that it is leaking under the portico adjacent to the original East entrance.

We're presently refining the repair plan and its timing. We are taking time to gather input and cost estimates from several contractors to make sure all this work is done in compliance with all applicable codes and in a way that will serve FLC water needs for the long term future. ①

The 2025 Janesville CROP Hunger Walk was great. The weather was perfect for the walk as over 100 people stepped out in solidarity to address hunger and food insecurity locally and around the world. Preliminary data shows that the walk raised \$57,171. That means \$14,293 will be used locally through ECHO and \$42,878 will go to Church World Services to be used nationally or internationally.

First Lutheran Church had a wonderful response to this year's CROP Hunger Walk. A total of 32 people walked with the First Lutheran Church team

After breakfast (8:30am), we'll move into the meeting agenda, which will cover key topics that will shape our church's future:

- 2025-26 Budget: We will review and approve the financial plan to support First Lutheran Church's mission and ministries for the upcoming year.
- Election of New Council Members:
  New leaders are vital to our
  continued growth and outreach.
  Four new members were appointed
  to fill open positions on the Council
  during the past year. Alexis Frank,
  Jarod Wasson, Colton Measner,
  and Kathy Meier. They have each
  contributed well and are willing
  to continue serving but need to

be confirmed by congregational vote. Join us in electing these Council members to keep guiding our church forward. We also give thanks for the faithful service of leaders whose terms are ending: Tim Drinkwater, Dennis Garvin, and Anne Thomas.

• New Organizational Structure: During the past year we have reviewed our organizational structure and are proposing a change from the current six program boards to a new set of teams that will more closely align with our vision goals. We'll discuss how this change could better serve our mission together.

At 9:30am, we will conclude our time together with **worship**, sharing Communion at our tables and giving thanks that we are sent to make God's love known.

As always, your voice matters. This morning provides an opportunity for all members to engage in important discussion and decision-making.

# PARTNERSHIP FOR THE SAKE OF THE GOSPEL

The South-Central Synod of Wisconsin gathered in Middleton for the 2025 Synod Assembly on May 16-17. Pr. Michael Mueller and Jarod Wasson were voting members from First Lutheran Church. David Moore from our congregation served as parliamentarian.

The Synod Assembly is an annual meeting that brings together leaders from congregations across south-central Wisconsin to conduct the synod's business. The Assembly provides opportunity to learn about the ministries of our congregations, the many partnerships that we share, and the work of the greater Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

On Friday evening, the Assembly acknowledged rostered leaders and congregations who are celebrating significant anniversaries this year. Pr. Michael Mueller and his wife Pr. Carol Baumgartner were both recognized for 35 years of ordained service in the ELCA.

On Saturday, we elected people to positions of leadership on the Synod Council and related committees. We approved a spending plan for 2026-2027, which will reduce the percentage of mission support shared with the ELCA churchwide

organization from 47% to 43%, avoiding cuts in funding at the local level. At the same time, the plan includes no increase in salary and benefits for synod staff. The challenge of supporting ministry with adequate resources is being felt at every level of the church.

Concerns for faithfulness in our time brought to us resolutions that address the distortions of the gospel by Christian nationalism, the need for the church to embody Christ for those most vulnerable, and a call to pursue truth and reconciliation for harms done in the past by church-sponsored Indian boarding schools.

Jarod Wasson took opportunity to talk with various people during the time of the Assembly. His take-away is that the synod is faithfully focused outward, seeking ways to serve the needs of our communities. He had a good time and welcomes others to consider this opportunity next year.

A similar Assembly at the ELCA churchwide level will take place this summer, July 28-August 2, in Phoenix, Arizona. We prayed for and blessed the members of our synod who have been elected to serve as voting members to that gathering. ©

## Collected Year Round

/arious FLC Circles and Mission Quilters gather items for the Lutheran World Wide Relief kits that are sent out in September all year round. With the rummage sale season approaching, please consider watching for baby items: receiving blankets, shirts, diapers, regular blankets, hats, sweaters, sweatshirts, diaper pins, socks, and onesies (these can be cut off). Sheets in good condition and cotton fabric are used by the quilters.

Full sized towels in good condition, new combs, toothbrushes, soap in boxes are some of the items used to fill the hygiene kits. Ball point pens, unsharpened pencils, hand pencil sharpeners, blunt scissors, rulers with metric and standard measurement. spiral notebooks, and 2 inch erasers are needed for the school kits. Sewing kits require thread and at least 2 yards of material, depending upon the width.

Collected items can be placed in the bins straight in from the parking lot entrance. ①

# COUNCIL MINUTES Highlights of April Minutes

#### Financial Report (Tim Drinkwater)

- Giving was above budget for March by \$75,079 (including matching, contributions and loose giving) and total income for March was above budget by \$75,721.
- Water Main Repair update
  - » Steve Shulta and Kevin McMullen presented on the water main break. Multiple plans were presented and discussed.
  - » Option 1 would be to complete a \$30,000 repair to our current 70 year old main
  - » Option 2 would be to complete a new water main that would make FLC sprinkler ready for \$65,000
  - » Motion approved to contract with designated firms for up to \$65,000 to complete a new 6" water service to make FLC sprinkler ready utilizing \$35,000 of funds from a previous donation designated for fire suppression and \$30,000 from existing Buildings and Grounds funds to be completed as soon as work can start.

#### Ministry Report - Pr. Michael

- Worship
  - » The Midweek Lent series focused on themes of shelter, refuge and safety in the psalms appointed for the Sundays in Lent. We averaged a total of around 40 people at the two prayer services each Wednesday.
  - » The Palm/Passion worship service this past Sunday connected deeply with many people.

#### **New Business**

- Matching Campaign April 1-June 30
  - » about \$6,000 has been raised
- First Fest
  - » will be held September 14 Family Reunion as the theme

#### **Unfinished Business**

- Masonry Repair update
  - » 2-3 weeks of work completed
  - » west side has started


