I HAVE GIVEN YOU AUTHORITY...

A recent Sunday Gospel story has stirred me to imagine something greater for our life together.

The story (Luke 10:1-20) describes how Jesus sent out 72 of his followers to bear the hope of God's reign into the world. These were not the 12 closest to him, but 72 others.



In his out-going instructions to this large group, Jesus first raises their expectations. "The harvest is huge, bigger than you can imagine." Seventy-two workers are still not enough to gather in all the people who are eager to experience the joy and hope of God's new community. So, pray for more workers to be sent out!


These partners of Jesus can anticipate a great readiness among the people in the towns to which they are being sent. I sense that this is no less true for us. The previous Surgeon General of the United States identified an epidemic of loneliness and isolation among us. Many people are hungry for connection and caring community. We all are navigating profound changes — from political

uncertainty to the rapid growth of AI to the changing climate. Many are thirsting for hope and healing, yearning for a guiding purpose to their lives. Doesn't Jesus send us out to gather such people into community, centered in the healing power of God's love?

The extent of the need and the depth of the challenges around us could easily become overwhelming. We might wonder how we could begin to make an impact in the face of it all.

But notice that the 72 are not sent out on their own strength. In fact, they are told to leave behind all money, extra supplies and resources, so that they must rely on the generosity of others. They go out vulnerably.

At the same time, they are given something profound. Jesus gives them authority to heal and to drive out the oppressive forces that bind people in discouragement and despair. He sends them with the gift of God's peace, the wholeness of God's presence. They

bear a reality much greater than themselves.

What if we were as bold, trusting the power of the Spirit to work healing, peace, and hope through our words and prayers and actions?

Repeatedly, we hear how Jesus heals everyone who comes to him. He brings God's peace and wholeness wherever he goes, tossing out the forces that deprive people of life and joy. Now we hear that he empowers his friends to go out and do the same -- to proclaim and enact the life of the kingdom of God.

First the 12, then 72 others; even these are not enough. More messengers are needed. Why shouldn't we be the ones to answer Jesus' prayer? His purpose hasn't changed. Heal. Share peace. Bring hope.

- Who do you know that needs to experience the power of new life?
- What encouragement or training do you need to bring that hope?
- What does it mean for you to trust the presence of the Spirit to work through you?

PATH TO DISCIPLESHIP

Still Figuring It Out: What A Disciple Really Is



The first disciples didn't know what they were signing up for. They didn't attend a class or get a textbook. They just heard Jesus say "Follow me," and they did.

They were ordinary people, learning in real time. They asked questions, made mistakes, and sometimes missed the point. But they stayed close to Jesus, and that's what made them disciples: not their knowledge, but their willingness to follow and grow.

Today, being a disciple isn't about having all the answers either. It's about walking with Jesus, learning to live the way He lived. Strangely enough, Jesus

Himself modeled this best; He listened to the Father, obeyed in love, and laid down His life in trust. He didn't just teach the way — He was the way.

Modern discipleship means choosing that same path. It's learning to love when it's inconvenient, to serve without applause, and to trust even when life is messy. It's not perfect people performing for God, it's real people walking with Him.

So, what is a disciple, really? It's someone who follows Jesus, even when they're still figuring out what that means. ①

2025 Mission Trip to North Carolina

We started our week in Beckley, West Virginia where we stayed on the way to North Carolina. On Sunday morning, we got up early and went zip lining, that was a great way to start the week


and after that we finished the trip to North Carolina.

called Spark'Dwell. Spark'Dwell is two non-profit organization that work together, one is Spark and the other is called the Dwelling. The Dwelling is a church that allows people to come as they are, their set up is less traditional, they have couches instead of pews, and their liturgy is different. Seeing the Dwelling and it's community allowed me to see how important that community is to people and truly made me see that each person is their own and you shouldn't judge them just because of how they look.

On our first day we did a pilgrimage, where we all got split into groups and we did a task that we would find easy, but isn't easy for the unhoused population. That day was so eye

opening and being able to see what others go through in their day to day life allowed me to be able to see that it isn't as easy as it seems. One big take away I got from this day



After this day I spent the next three days working at Horizons which is a residential care that works with people with intellectual and physical



disabilities. This really challenged my skills, it was amazing getting to see how well cared for the people were and how much the staff really enjoyed being around the residents.

Each night we had different activities to do, almost every night included going out into the community and meeting new people.

I really enjoyed this mission trip and being able to meet new people and creating friendships of a lifetime. Our theme for the week was (un)rest and throughout the week it allowed me to realize that everybody's unrest looks different.

I want to thank Eric and Renee for this opportunity because I truly think this mission trip is one that will forever make an impact on my life and it is one that I wish more people would have been able to experience. ver wish there was a simple, comfortable way you could share your faith? How about becoming a "first visitor/caller"? "What's that?" you ask. Those are a couple of easy ways you can connect with our homebound people and brighten their day, by phone or with a personal visit.

First Lutheran has had a faithful group of people who visit and share Communion with some of our members who are homebound, either because of health or age-related issues. These visitors might take a recent bulletin or maybe a devotion booklet from the church along with the elements of Communion that have been blessed during worship and share it with those who otherwise could not share in the Lord's Supper regularly.

We need others to step up to help by becoming a "first visitor".

And if making a personal visit doesn't suit you, we hope to start a group of "first callers" whose mission would

be to connect to one or more of our elderly members with a short phone call each day or as desired, to check on those who live alone and to brighten the day of someone who can no longer get out.

Pastor Jim will hold a short, informative meeting on Wed, Aug 20, at 11am to discuss both of these options as we seek to find new ways to stay connected to our "seasoned saints'! We'll meet in the Chapel. Information will be shared about this ministry and questions answered. A list of known home-bound members will be available from which to select one or more homebound members to visit or phone. Some of our homebound wish Communion monthly, some prefer every few months or even bi-yearly.



COUNCIL MINUTES Highlights of June Minutes

Financial Report (Tim Drinkwater)

- Giving was below budget for May by -\$1,195.36 (including matching, contributions and loose giving) and total income for May was below budget by -\$5,216.52.
- For the YTD figures (July through May 2025): Giving was below budget by -\$15,246 and is now below last fiscal year (including the matching campaign amounts and loose giving) by -\$52,725. Total income for July through May is below budget by -\$8,770. Because of the matching campaign last year, income is still lower than what was brought in for the 23-24 fiscal year by -\$54,124.

- Worship
