WHOSE DAILY BREAD?

n his Small Catechism, Martin Luther taught that "daily bread" includes all that we need to live from day to day – not only food but clothing, shelter, money, property, loving family members, good government, favorable weather, health, peace, good friends and neighbors, and more.



We tend to hear this petition for daily bread as an appeal to God that our own personal needs would be met. And certainly, our own needs are a legitimate concern and are not hidden from God. Jesus assures us that, as well as God cares for the ravens and the wildflowers, God knows what we need and will provide for us abundantly (Luke 12:22-31).

Interestingly, though, directly after teaching his disciples how to pray, Jesus tells a parable that focuses on *bread for a guest*.

Jesus describes how a friend arrives late at night, and the host has no bread to offer (Luke 11:5-13). He knocks on his neighbor's door until the neighbor shares some bread to meet his need. The need in this case is to provide hospitality to the guest. In contrast to the reluctant neighbor, who is slow to get out of bed in the middle of the night to answer his friend's request,

God does not need to be convinced to respond to us. Ask, seek, and knock, Jesus concludes, "for everyone who asks receives, and everyone who searches finds, and for everyone who knocks, the door will be opened."

This parable opens our imaginations to consider the abundant and eager generosity of God. Even more, it reveals the communal quality of God's kingdom and will. Within the order of God's kingdom, where God's will is done, our whole lives will be oriented to God in loving trust. Our care and attention will be as much for our neighbor's need as for ourselves.



Awareness of God's generous heart opens our eyes to the many daily gifts that we take for granted. To see clearly all that we have already received allows us to breathe out our persistent fears of scarcity. We become free then to align ourselves with God's own joy in giving. "Seek God's kingdom and all the rest will be given to you as well." When that truth sinks in, we begin to realize the freedom we have to share generously. Perhaps, as the parable suggests, our deepest need for daily bread is that we would have it to share with others.

Since mid-September, the Sunday preaching series has focused on "What We Can Do" in response to God's rich generosity. That series concludes Nov 16, when you will be invited to offer a personal response.


Consider the ways you have encountered God's generosity in your own life. How have you experienced abundance in the form of compassion, healing, opportunity, joy, or resources? How are you moved to share what you have received?

We will make an offering of these things on Sunday, November 16. Gifts of time, skills, and leadership are valuable expressions of gratitude. What would you like to offer of yourself? How do you feel called to give yourself for others? It may be through a ministry of the congregation or some other opportunity in the community. Financial commitments made to FLC will empower us together to provide a community of safety for children and families, a place of grace, hospitality, and love for all. Your gifts will also support service among our neighbors in the community and in the world beyond.

The bread we share with others ensures that all have plenty. What bread have you received that you can now share? ①

PATH TO DISCIPLESHIP

Together on the Road: Community and Accountability



lt takes a community. The New Testament is full of reminders that Christians grow when in community.

Proverbs 27:17- "As iron sharpens iron, so one person sharpens another."

Galatians 6:2- "Carry each other's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ."

James 5:16- "Therefore confess your sins to each other and pray for each other so that you may be healed.

The prayer of a righteous person is powerful and effective."

Jesus approach to ministry was relational, focused on a small group of followers to pour his life into. This small group allowed for intimate and consistent instruction, spiritual modeling, and personal transformation. The goal of Jesus ministry was to produce disciples that could make more disciples. By pouring his life into twelve men, Jesus established a solid group of men (a community) that would spread his message to the world. The model of community and accountability found in Jesus small group of followers lets

us know that discipleship is not just a study of beliefs but a way of life lived out together.

Just as Jesus mentored his disciples, every Christian is called to receive guidance and wisdom from more mature believers.

Ecclesiastes 4:9-10- "Two are better than one, because they have a good return for their labor: If either of them falls down, one can help the other up."

The cycle of discipleship is completed when we invest in the spiritual lives of others. This is a command from Jesus himself, who instructed his followers to "go and make disciples", Matthew 28:19. As you help someone grow, you strengthen your own spiritual walk. Mentoring is not just for Bible experts; anyone who is a follower of Christ can point others to Jesus. This mentoring process strengthens the entire community. Being mentored and mentoring others, creates a cycle of spiritual multiplication that builds the church and makes our community stronger. 🗇

Highlights of Sept Minutes

Financial Report (Jarod Wasson)

- People continued to give toward the matching campaign in August.
 Combining both the regular and matching donations, we were over budget by about \$14,652. With the monthly donation for the visitation pastor, we are over budget for total income by \$18,150 in August.
- Giving was above budget by \$9,227 and is above last fiscal year (including the matching campaign amounts and loose giving) by \$28,059. Total income for July through August is above budget by \$12,534. Income is above what was brought in for the 24-25 fiscal year by \$34,818.

 - » Action Item: Building and Ground will reach out to Angus Young to discuss options and plans for moving staff for building safety.

The weekly need is calculated by averaging the total budgeted expenses for 12 months (from July 2025 through June of 2026). The weekly average YTD is the total income received, divided by the number of weeks in this fiscal year, to date. The graph shows the budgeted expenses


in green, the actual expenses in blue and the monthly income received as a black dot and line. Total income for July through September is above budget by \$14,933. Expenses are slightly lower than anticipated, so income continues to be higher than monthly expenses for the first 3 months of the fiscal year. ①
